

STATEMENT of Beaumont Gereau, in effort  
to have sentence commuted

At the age of 68, and after 46 years of incarceration, I feel that the greater part of my productive life has been spent immersed in the Prison House.

Eventhough, I was just 22 at the beginning of my prison ordeal, today with no animosity or bitterness as motivation, I just would like to be given the chance to give back something to society.

I would also like to have interaction with my eight (8) grand children, and be able to give and share with them, things that I was unable to give their parents.

There is nothing in my prison records to indicate that I have a high propensity for violence, as in all my years in prison I have never been charged with any serious acts of violence.

If released, I would reside at my family's home, and I have employment awaiting me as a retail salesman.

In 2000, I was diagnosed with Hep. C, and to this date I have never received treatment for this virus, as bloodtest must indicate a very high level of liver damage before treatment is offered.

Within the last year, I have requested that a "Fiber scan" test be done to determine the



CONDITION of my Liver.

As a result, the officials of this "PRIVATE PRISON" where I AM presently being housed, contacted the V.I BUREAU of CORRECTIONS, AND ASKED if they should provide me with the "FIBERSCAN" test.

The Medical Director of the V.I. BUREAU of CORRECTIONS Responded by telling the Officials here NOT to provide me with the test, because REGARDLESS of what the Results SAID, the V.I. Government would NOT provide the TREATMENT for Hep. C.

The Medical Director for the V.I. BUREAU of CORRECTIONS is a Ms M. Callwood, M.D.

FOR these Aforesaid REASONS, I feel THAT I AM DESERVING of A SECOND CHANCE AT Life.
